### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Hinsdale:

þ

We have come to the end of another year, and we would like to discuss the financial status of the Town at this time.

The Board is happy to report that their budget for 1966 is down by approximately \$16,000.00.

We are asking the Voters to approve \$3,500.00 from a bond issue for the Town's share of its Chapter 90, new construction work. It is our belief that this is the best possible use for this money, as we get one-third matching funds from the State and County, and by doing this all the money that goes into our Machinery Earnings Fund comes from sources other than appropriation. The Town received approximately \$7,000.00 of the bond issue from Chapter 679, Acts of 1965, and we have three years to spend it in, at a maximum of one-third per year. As we did not spend any in 1965, we will be able to spend more than the one-third in 1966.

Another great source of savings has come again from the Welfare appropriation, which is down \$8,000.00 from 1965. There are several reasons why this has come about. The main reason is proper administration. By this we mean, seeing that the Town does not give any aid, that we do not receive full reimbursement for, from the State and Federal Government. In turn, this means not giving aid where it is not needed. The Board has set up a program, with Mrs. Josephine Eames, Welfare Director, in the General Assistance Department which puts recipients who are able, to work for the aid they receive. This program, along with some changes in Welfare Laws, has reduced the expenditure approximately \$4,000.00 in two years. The great bulk of General Relief comes directly from the Taxpayer's pocket. There is very little reimbursement in this category, and it is essential that we keep General Relief to a minimum. The Board would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Eames and her very able staff for doing a fine job in the Welfare Department.

These two items constitute some of the major savings in our 1966 budget, and along with some slight increases in other departments, we have no revaluation cost this year, which would seem to put us in a sound financial position.

There is, however, an ominous note that we must briefly touch upon. This is the ever rising cost of education. We have been told that an addition on our Regional High School is imminent. There is also some talk of an addition to our own Kittredge School. While these things may be necessary, along with the general increases we have in operating expenses, they put an overwhelming burden on the Taxpayer. These education costs are not allowing the Town to progress. While we do not have the answers as to what should be done, we do suggest that the Taxpayer be aware of where his tax dollar is going. At the present time, over 60% of the budget is going for education, and because of this, the savings that we have previously commented upon, may not bring much relief for the present tax rate.

In the past year, two Special Town Meetings were held. At the first, the Voters rejected an appropriation to purchase a road grader. The second was held in December, and the Voters approved the purchase of a new truck, chassis, and plow for the Highway Department. They also voted to amend the Junk Car By-Law, allowing for a fine to be levied on those who are in violation of the Law.

There seems to be a lessening of interest on the part of the citizens of the Town, and other Towns for that matter, to become participants in Town Offices and affairs. We have, at this time, two vacancies on the Finance Board, which could possibly be increased after the Annual Elections. This has made it very difficult for the Board and its Chairman to conduct its business. The Selectmen would like to see people take a more active part in their Town Government. This would be beneficial to both the individual, and to the Town, as it would make for a better understanding of the problems that arise and how they are solved. At times, it is very difficult to understand why Town Officers take the action that they do. By being a member of the Finance Committee, one has a first hand view of all expenditures of the Town.

In closing, the Board of Selectmen would like to ask all citizens of the Town, whenever a problem arises, to bring it before the Board at its regular weekly meeting, if possible. A solution to the particular problem can be more readily reached before the entire Board.

### ORDER OF BUSINESS

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts you are hereby required and directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hinsdale qualified by law to vote in the election and town affairs, to meet in the auditorium of Kittredge School in Hinsdale on Saturday, February 12, 1966 at 10:00 A. M. to choose and elect by official ballot the following officers:

Moderator for one year, one Selectman for three years, one Assessor for three years, Town Clerk for 3 years, one member of the School Committee for three years, Auditor for one year, Tree Warden for one year, three members of the Finance Board for three years, one member of the Finance Board for two years.

The Polls will be open at 10 o'clock A. M. and will remain open continuously until 6:00 o'clock P. M. of said day when they may be closed.

You are further required to notify and warn the aforesaid voters of said Town of Hinsdale to meet in the Kittredge School Auditorium on Monday, February 7, 1966 at 7:00 P. M. then and there to act on the following articles:

- Art. 1—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint all non-elective minor officers necessary or required to be chosen by the Town.
- Art. 2—To act upon the reports of the Selectmen, the School Committee, and other elected or appointed officers of the Town.
- Art. 3—To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of jurors presented by the Selectmen.
- Art. 4—To see if the Town will vote to give the Tax Collector the same powers
  Town Treasurers have by law when appointed Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 5—To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue for the financial years beginning January 1, 1966 and January 1, 1967, in accordance with provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17, or take any other action relative thereto.

- Art. 6—To see if the Town will vote to constitute the Board of Selectmen the Board of Public Welfare for the year 1966 and to authorize an annual salary of \$50 for each member for attendance at meetings and \$50 additional for the District Representative for attendance at District meetings.
- Art. 7—To see if the Town will vote to have the cash in the Treasury transferred to help defray the expenses of the ensuing year.
- Art. 8—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Overlay Reserve surplus fund the sum of \$3500.00 for a Reserve Fund.
- Art. 9—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00. \$500.00 to be raised by taxation, and \$500.00 to be transferred from the State Aid for Libraries Account. This sum and the amount of the Dog Tax money to be given to the Hinsdale Free Public Library.
- Art. 10—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for work on the Plunkett Reservoir Road.
- Art. 11—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$12,950.00 for Chapter 81 Highway Maintenance; \$2,775.00 to be raised by taxation, and the remainder by borrowing in anticipation of reimbursement or by transferring from unappropriated available funds in the treasury.
- Art. 12—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$14,000.00 for Chapter 90, Construction; \$3,500.00 to be transferred from the Bond Issue Chapter 679, of The Acts of 1965, and the remainder by borrowing in anticipation of reimbursement. This money to be used as follows: \$12,000.00 to continue work on Chapter 90 projects, \$2,000.00 to be added to the fund for rebuilding the bridge on Old Dalton Road, over the Housatonic River at the Junction with Route 8.
- Art. 13—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$7,500.00 for Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance; \$2,500.00 to be raised by taxation, and the remainder by borrowing in anticipation of reimbursement or by transferring from unappropriated available funds in the treasury.
- Art. 14—To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$3,500.00 from the Road Machinery Fund for Road Machinery Maintenance.
- Art. 15—To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on pole 48/B 4 on the Old Windsor Road.

- Art. 16—To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 from free cash to erect a suitable fence on the westerly line of the Athletic Field, to be reestablished by a survey before erecting said fence.
- Art. 17—To see if the Town will vote to grant the Hinsdale Recreation Association permission to use the Town Hall as a Youth Center, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Association which shall define both the Town's and the Association's responsibilities regarding the use and maintenance of the property and also the conditions for use of the Town appropriation.
- Art. 18--To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the maintenance and care of Plunkett Lake.
- Art. 19—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for maintenance of Town Garage.
- Art. 20—To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the Town Officers in accordance with Section 108, Chapter 31 of the General Laws, as follows:

### REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

All items for the 1966 budget have been reviewed and approved by the Finance Committee, the total of which is \$362,263.24, which is \$22,748 less than the 1965 budget and could show a possible reduction in tax rate based on State reinbursements remaining the same or increasing, and that the Town valuation does not decrease.

In reviewing the budget details it will be noted that while some departments were increased others were decreased. The major area of concern is in the school department and the charity accounts. While the over all school costs increased for 1966 by some \$7,350 the charity accounts decreased by \$8,000 with an additional decrease in the administration of the charity accounts of \$619.

### Comments on Items in The Budget

The operating money for Kittredge School has increased again this year by \$7,495, as compared to 1965 after adjustments by public law 874. The increase is largely in the area of salaries. In the Regional High School money, we had a decrease in the capital cost money and an increase in the operating cost money, which ended up with a total decrease of \$147 in our favor.

The Kittredge School Lunch program appears to have worked out very well this past year, with the arrangement as agreed to by the Selectmen and the School Committee, in that the School Committee have full control of the program and the Town makes a subsidy donation to the operating fund. The amount of money to the fund this year will remain the same.

Our main charity accounts were reduced in total again this year by some \$\$,000 and in addition the administration costs to the Town were reduced by \$619. The decreases are attributed to carry over Federal Aid money and good management. Congratulations are in order for the Director of these accounts.

No snow fence will be purchased this year, the Selectmen agree they have enough on hand now. A saving of \$300.

The Town Hall Maintenance Account generated much discussion between the Selectmen and the Finance Committee over the fact that changes have taken place since the original agreement between the Town and the Lions organization in the use of the Town Hall building. In the sense that the building is now being operated by a new organization, mainly the "Hinsdale Recreation Association. Inc." it was agreed that the agreement for the use of the building should now be between the new organization and the Town, and that all bills for its operation and maintenance should be contracted in the name of the new organization. It was further agreed between the Selectmen and the Finance Committee that a subsidy donation could be given the new organization each year mainly to maintain the building and grounds. The amount of subsidy to be determined each year as the needs were reviewed. The amount recommended this year is \$1200. It was further agreed that the Selectmen would have the responsibility to see that the building and grounds were being cared for properly to the betterment of the Town and if necessary request of the organization, that certain things be done at the expense of the organization. With the above in mind the account name under item 29 in the Finance Committee's report has been changed from "Town Hall Maintenance" to "Hinsdale Recreation Association, Inc."

The Town Officers' Salaries Account was reduced \$50 this year because of a State ruling whereby they would have supervision over the operation of Sealer of Weights and Measures.

The Library Account was increased by \$500 this year. This account has been supported by the refund on the dog tax along with a \$500. State Aid reimbursement with no reflection on the tax rate. Their request for an additional \$500 this year was accepted by the Finance Committee as needed for their operations. This \$500 will be in the tax rate. The money to support the library will therefor come from three sources this year, which are Dog Tax refund, State Aid for Libraries and taxation. The \$500 represents approximately 20 cents on the tax rate.

In the \$14,000 of Chapter 90 road construction program for the new year, we have a breakdown of three sources for the money as follows: \$3500 comes from the Town, \$3500 comes from the County and the remaining \$7000 comes from the State. This year the Town has its \$3500 share from a bond issue grant from the State, therefor it will not go into tax rate. \$2000 of this \$14,000 goes into a fund which will eventually be used for a new bridge across the Housatonic River in the lower valley.

The Stabilization Fund has been increased by \$5,000 this year based on the surplus monies available. The whole amount of \$15,000 will be appropriated from available monies in the Town Treasury and will not reflect in the tax rate.

The Tax Title Account this year will include the money normally allowed in Item 31 of the Finance Committee's report. The larger amount of \$3700 is necessary for costs involved in the closing of tax titles on several parcels of real estate

taken by the Town because of non-payment of taxes. It is requested that this \$3700 be appropriated from surplus available cash and thus will not have any effect on the tax rate. The money will return to the surplus cash account at a later date on sale of the real estate.

The article requesting money for the erection of a fence on the westerly side of the Athletic Field on South Street has been agreed to by the Finance Committee as a necessity to fullfil an agreement entered into when the Town accepted the deed to the property. It was further agreed that the line on which this fence should be erected, be reestablished by a competent surveyor. The \$500 appropriated for the purpose should cover all expenses and will be taken from the surplus available money and will not reflect in the tax rate.

# REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF AND FOREST WARDEN

To Board of Selectmen

#### Gentlemen:

I hereby submit my report as Chief of the Fire Department in the Town of Hinsdale for the year ending December 31, 1965.

The Department answered (30) calls as follows: structural fires 4, oil burner fires 3, chimney fires, 4, grass fires 5, forest fires 5, electric fires 2, train fires 2, car fires 3, false alarms 1, plus these in town fires we answered 3 mutual-aid calls to other towns.

A total of 28 applications for installation and permits for all types of oil burning equipment and the storage of oil were issued and inspected.

The following changes in the fire laws were posted in the Post Office in June. All are now in force.

Chapter 148 of the General Laws, Section 25A reads as follows:

No person shall sell, offer for sale or install a second hand space heater, or a second hand portable stove which uses kerosene range oil, or number one fuel oil for fuel. No persons shall install or use in any building which is used in whole or in part for human habitation any unvented space heater which uses gas or oil as fuel. Whoever violates any provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars.

Section 25B

On or after July 1, 1965, no person shall use or allow to be used a space heater in any building which is used in whole or in part for human habitation. As used in this section "SPACE HEATERS" include, portable space heaters, parlor heaters, cabinet heaters, room heaters, and any other similar heater having a barometric feed fuel control and its supply (fuel) tank located less than forty-two (42) inches from the center of the burner and means the type of heating appliance adapted for burning kerosene, range oil, or number one fuel oil and used principally for the heating of the space in and adjacent to that in which such appliance is located. Whoever violates any provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars.

Persons having oil burning equipment in their homes should have them checked and cleaned once a year but only by a licensed oil burner man.

Out-of-doors practices start early in the spring and continue every Tuesday night throughout the summer until cold weather restricts it.

I would like at this time to thank all the townspeople that helped the Fire Department this year. Also the Firemen's Auxiliary which has become an integral part of the Department.

To keep the possibility of fire down check around your burn barrels to make sure there are no combustibles around it, such as leaves, wood, etc. Also keep a spark screen to cover the barrel at all times when it's burning especially during the critical fire period in the Spring and Fall.

All out-of-doors burning except in closed containers require a burning permit.

#### HISTORY OF THE HINSDALE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

The year 1966 marks the 100th anniversary of the dedication of the library building at the corner of South and Maple Streets. The cornerstone of the stone English-style edifice was laid in July, 1866. The granite blocks from which it was made were quarried on the farm of John Cady in the northeast section of the Town. William and David Dwyer, contractors, with masons from Connecticut, laid the blocks. The interior with high-vaulted ceiling in the main room, with high arches and interlacing beams and gallery of weathered oak is pure English architecture. The structure was completed in December 1866 and opened for public use on June 1, 1867, with more than 4000 volumes.

The plan of the building is a copy of one seen in England by the Rev. and Mrs. Kinsley Twining while on their wedding trip. Mrs. Twining, the former Mary Plunkett, and daughter of the Honorable Charles H. Plunkett died at the age of twenty-nine years. In her will she left the sum of \$5000 as the original endowment of the library. The Plunkett, Kittredge and Taylor families, all early Hinsdale settlers, have since given more than \$20,000 for the library.

Early in 1866 the following petition was presented to the General Court of the state: "To the honorable members of the Senate and House of Representatives for the year 1866: We, the undersigned Kinsley Twining, Thomas K. Plunkett, W. Ambrose Taylor, George T. Plunkett, Charles J. Kittredge, for ourselves, our associates and successors, respectfully ask to be incorporated as a public library association for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a public library in the Town of Hinsdale with a capital not to exceed \$50,000, and with the right to hold real estate not exceeding \$30,000." The petition was granted and on June 5, 1866 the following officers were elected: president, The Rev. Kinsley Twining; treasurer, W. Ambrose Taylor, secretary, George T. Plunkett. Charles J. Kittredge gave the land for the library building. The Library Association consists of residents of the Town who appoint new members, and the office is for life. The president of Williams College was officer ex officio, of the association when it was organized in 1866.

George T. Plunkett was the first librarian, succeeded in 1870 by Miss Celestia Barrows, who held the position until 1892. Pitt Birmingham succeeded her and served from 1892 till 1917, when Mrs. Cora Lovell became librarian. Mrs. Lovell served until September 1944 when illness forced her to resign. She died in April, 1945. Mrs. Dorothy Lyman took over in September, 1944; ably performing the duties of librarian until resigning October 31, 1964 after 20 years of service. Mrs. Caroline Service held the office for less than one year. She was succeeded by Mrs. Olive Drosehn on October 1, 1965.

The Library Association in January 1966 was Mrs. Emily R. Pierce, Miss Alma E. Haydock, Carl R. Mosegard, Paul A. Meyers and Mrs. Dorothy Lyman. The Town Library Committee consists of Earl C. Suitor, Mrs. Katherine Kirchner and the Rev. R. Jerry Morgan.

# REPORT OF EASTERN BERKSHIRE WELFARE DISTRICT

The Eastern Berkshire Welfare District, established on July 1, 1951 has continued to be very active.

With the growing need for more adequate storage space and space to include proper privacy for interviews the Prudential Committee leased a building constructed and owned by Kelly Realty Co. of Pittsfield and situated on South Street, Hinsdale. The office was moved to the present location on February 20, 1965.

I would like to acknowledge the fine cooperation shown by the Hinsdale Prudential Committee member, Louis J. Carmel, who has been most helpful in matters of policy determination, and Mrs. Nancy Carroll, Hinsdale Treasurer, who also has worked very closely with me.

Public Assistance costs, in general, continue to rise. Although the cost of living index has risen to a new high during the past year, it was not enough of an over all increase to raise the assistance budgets. Those receiving Old Age Assistance did receive an increase in Leisure Time activity allowance which became effective November 1, 1965 and which will affect those budgets for the whole year of 1966. Medical costs are high and these expenses affect all budgets regardless of category.

On 1/1/65 there were 45 active cases in Hinsdale; 14 cases were added during the year and 12 cases were closed out. The net number of recipients at the end of this year receiving aid is 65 representing 51 cases.

Total expenditures for Public Assistance this past year has been \$70,701.18. Total reimbursements for the year have been \$57,342.02, showing a net cost of \$13,359.16. However, these reimbursements are not on the same expenditures since OAA—MAA—AFDC—and DA reimbursements are paid on the basis of claims presented monthly, subject to a later audit. Payments are received two months later, therefore reimbursements and expenditures can never match, month for month, in the fiscal year. Administrative costs to Hinsdale per case this past year has been \$23.45.

Federal accounts are known as revolving accounts and money coming in as reimbursements from the Federal government and still remaining unspent at the end of the year, may be carried over to the next year to be used against assistance needs. Hinsdale has substantial balances in Old Age Assistance, Medical Aid to the Aged, Aid to Families with Dependent Children and Disability Assistance to be carried forward to 1966.

We can look forward to increasing costs for hospitalization this next year and higher nursing home rates, both of which are set by the State Director of Hospital and Nursing Costs and Finances. I have tried to take these anticipated expenses into consideration in my request to the Finance Board for their consideration of the 1966 budget.

It is my responsibility to administer assistance and to apply the law and policies of the State and Town, which I will do to the best of my ability.

In closing, I wish to extend my sincere cooperation as well as my appreciation to the Town officials with whom I work.

# REPORT OF ROAD SUPERINTENDENT

The following is an account of work done during 1965:

#### Chapter 81

All roads were scraped at least three times.

All roads were graveled where needed.

Treated with asphalt

Curtis Street 1,000 ft.
Middlefield Road 600 ft.

Three miles of road were widened to a width twenty-five to thirty feet, where they were only ten to twelve feet before. This makes a better road and at the same time saves money on Snow Removal.

## **Chapter 90 Construction**

#### Creamery Road

Again I was able to build more road than ever before. We had hundreds of tree stumps to root out and banks to excavate that were twelve feet high and hundreds of yards of fill to draw away, but I proved again that with the skillful handling of our loader this work can be done.

We were able to put in 3,000 ft. of road and at the same time widen a mile on the same road that will hasten the construction in the future.

#### Snow Roads

We are using 1,800 tons of washed sand mixed with 60 tons of salt on your roads in winter. I'm quite sure that no other town in the State the size of Hinsdale uses any where near that much. But still for the fifth consecutive winter I have done your roads for \$12,000.

#### Bridges

Bridges were planked and repaired.

I'm ashamed of one bridge known as the railroad bridge on Bridge St. This bridge has always been fixed by the Railroad, for years since the bridge was built in 1902 they take care of the side walks and all the underside of the bridge. The town takes care of the planking on the top side of the roadway and that's all.

The railroad hasn't done a thing on that Bridge for ten years or more. It's so rotten underneath our plank that we just can't make spikes hold in their rotten timbers.

Now people complain to me about the sidewalks where teenage boys kick or pull those boards off the railing. I go and spend taxpayer's money which I have no legal right to do, and in a day or so they're broken off again.

I strongly urge that something be done about it.

Thanking the Board of Selectmen for the cooperation they have given me and for all others who cooperate with me.

#### REPORT OF VETERANS' AGENT

The Veterans' Service Department spent ten thousand one hundred dollars during the year 1965. Of this amount, one hundred dollars was transferred from the Reserve Fund to the Veterans' Aid Account.

The greatest portion of money spent went for everyday living expenses to qualified veterans and/or their families. Following in order with regard to money spent per category came Nursing Homes, Hospitals, Medications, Doctors, Dentists and Miscellaneous.

With an eye ahead to the coming year it would seem that a budget comparable to this year's Ten Thousand dollar budget is in order. While the cost of nearly every service, or commodity continues to rise, some aspects of the situation appear brighter.

The newly originated Medicare program sponsored by the Federal Government may well prove beneficial. At present financial aid is being disbursed monthly to seven people over sixty-five years of age. Of these seven people, five are not eligible to be admitted to V. A. Hospitals. The two that are could conceivably be forced to enter local hospitals for one reason or another. Namely, no opening at V. A. hospital, or an emergency where the situation demands the nearest hospital. The savings that could be realized from the possibility of these people being hospitalized and Veterans' Services not having to pay the cost as in years past could very well be substantial.

Also on the brighter side of the situation is the fact that two V.A. pensions are pending for applicants that are now receiving aid from the Town. Furthermore two applications for pension increases are also pending under the "Housebound Veteran" classification. Should these pension requests be approved a savings of approximately twelve hundred dollars will probably be realized.

In closing I would like to note that a total of thirty-two Veterans were aided during the past year. Of this number nineteen received administrative aid while the remainder received financial assistance.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Committee and the Citizens of Hinsdale:

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This is the twenty-first report which I have submitted as Superintendent of this School Union.

Preparing the children of Hinsdale for the demanding experiences of temorrow is the primary job of the school. More is required of the pupil at the elementary level, as well as those of other levels of education. A great deal of study is being made to ascertain the placement and content of the subject matter, as well as a more efficient method of presentation for understanding of what is to be learned.

Changes are being made and we are keeping up with the new demands. We are working with the other towns of this region on a local study. A guide for mathematics and one for science have been developed by joint curriculum committees. Mr. Sharron, our principal, has been chainman of the Mathematics Committee, and he has served on the Science Committee. Reading, social-studies, and English are to be studied next. Mathematics textbooks have been purchased this year for Grades 5, 7, 8 and consumable books for the first three grades. New Science books have been added for Grade 4 and literature books for Grades 5 and 8. We plan to obtain math books for Grade 6 and science books for Grades 5 and 6, as well as social-studies texts for Grade 8, this coming year. A new encyclopedia has been placed in the fifth grade. This textbook plan results in less than one new textbook per pupil per year, but is progress in the right direction.

We are pleased with our physical education program. The benefits of this program are easily recognized. This is a big change from what was offered only a few years ago. Mr. Murray, who conducts this program, is also vice-principal especially charged with the discipline of the school. He is getting good results. I should like to commend all of the teachers who are working so conscientiously—keeping abreast of the new developments and getting good results.

Mr. Murray Kellogg, our art teacher, resigned to go into business. Mrs. Constance Senseney was appointed to replace him. We were very fortunate in being able to obtain the services of Mrs. Judith Dodge, an experienced music teacher, to teach the vocal music in our school. We had been a year without a vocal teacher. Mr. Roberts continues with the instrumental music.

Mr. Frank Baumann retired last summer after many years of conscientious care of the Kittredge School building. We all wish him many years of happy retirement.

Mr. William Gargan was appointed custodian and came to us well prepared, and is carrying on a fine job.

The lunch program has grown. 26,589 lunches were served this year. Previous to 1965 the town appropriated \$2300 for this program. This year that was reduced to \$1100.00. We will be able to continue with this plan for 1966. An additional refrigerator was purchased by this program last February.

After a conference with the Selectmen, a School Space Study Committee was formed, consisting of the School Committee, the Selectmen, and two members of the Finance Committee. They have had one meeting where the needs were outlined. As our solution depends on the decisions of the Town of Dalton, this committee is awaiting further action by Dalton. If a regional junior high school is to be the solution, this will take care of our needs for the forseeable future. If this isn't the solution, other steps can be taken.

A program for painting the interior of the Kittredge School has been started. Some painting has been done this year and \$400 is in the budget for 1966. It has been planned that some will be done each year, rather than all at once.

#### Budget:

A comparison of the items in the 1965 budget with the 1965 expenditures, and the 1966 budget shows many items remain the same. The total 1966 budget is up \$7,497.00 or about 6%. Most of this was for salaries. The teacher salary account reflects the increases resulting in the state minimum increase to \$5,000, in September 1965. This was in the 1965 budget for four months, but in the 1966 budget it will be for twelve months. The minimum salary of \$5100 was established as of September 1966. You will note that the \$5100 minimum is in line with that of towns in this area and in this state. We must remember that one must be a college graduate to teach and continued study must be made to keep up with the teaching demands. There is a new item of \$500 for the wiring of our auxiliary generator so that it could be used for running the heating equipment in an emergency.

I would like to commend the School Committee on the serious attention they have given to school matters and their business-like approach to fiscal matters. They have endeavored to keep in mind the best interest of the school, and an eye on the expenditures. This is their job, and they are doing it well.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Mr. Earl C. Suitor Superintendent of Schools Hinsdale, Mass.

Dear Mr. Suitor:

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I hereby submit the annual Health report for Kittredge School for the year 1965.

Physical examinations of Grades 1-4 and 7, as well as all new students were completed by Dr. Hans Rasch, School Physician. On the whole, the children were found to be in good health, the most noted defects were dental caries and enlarged tonsils.

The Mantoux tests for tuberculosis were given to the children in grades 1-4 and 7, all new students and school personnel, with follow-up X-rays to the positive reactors. These tests were done with the assistance of Mrs. Mary Coughlin, R.N. of the Tuberculosis Clinic at Pittsfield General Hospital.

A dental survey was conducted by Mrs. Elizabeth Watt, State Dental Hygienist with fewer defects being found among the children. A dental movie, and Plack test for grades 6 and 8 were very informative.

Vision and hearing tests were given to all children. The parents of those children failing the tests were notified with the majority of parents bringing their children to specialists for further examinations.

Reports on Vision, Hearing and Handicapped, as well as Physical examinations are sent to the State Department every year.

In May and June, Diphtheria and Tetanus boos'er shots were made available to the 1-4-7 grades and all school personnel. Efforts will be made to get the children on the prescribed five year schedule.

A Diabetic Detection drive was conducted in November with the National Average taking the test being 20 percent. Our average at Kittredge School was close fo 50% which was very good for the first year. Those with positive findings were notified and free blood tests were done at the local hospitals.

Influenza Vaccine was made available to the personnel of the school, with half participating.

I have attended several very informative In-Service programs in Pittsfield, Amherst and Springfield on subjects relating to Public Health and School Nursing.

I wish to thank the School Committee, Teachers, Parents and children for their interest and cooperation in the School Health Program.

# BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF HINSDALE

- Article 1. All town meetings shall be notified by the officer or other person to whom the warrant thereof shall be directed, by posting attested copies of the warrant in three public places within the Town, one of which may be the Post Office, and the others may be stores in the village.
- Article 2. The Selectmen at every annual town meeting for the choice of town officers, shall make a full report of their proceedings relative to the municipal affairs of the town, and present a statement of the financial concerns of the town, with an estimate of the sums of money necessary to be raised for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. The Selectmen shall cause their own report of the town together with the reports of the Treasurer, School Committee, Road Commissioner, Collector of Taxes, and Auditing Committee, the By-Laws of the town (except the truant By-Laws), and the Articles contained in the Warrant for the annual town meeting for the choice of town officers, to be printed and bound together in a convenient form and a sufficient number for the use of voters of the town, and shall provide for the free distribution of the same at least five days before the annual town meeting for the choice of town officers; and the officers above named shall prepare their reports and present them to the Selectmen in season for publication as required above.
- Article 4. The Assessors shall complete the assessment of taxes and commit the same, with their warrant, to the Collector, on or before the first day of July in each year; provided the Collector shall have given a bond as required by law.
- Article 5. If the Collector shall be unable to collect taxes, assessed after full exercise of the powers conferred upon him as Collector, he shall report the same to the Assessors, with his request for an abatement before the first annual town meeting for the choice of town officers following his election.
- Article 6. The Assessors shall annually recommend to the town at the annual town meeting for the choice of town officers such taxes as they may determine ought to be abated which the Collector has reported to them as uncollectible. In no case shall the Assessors abate a tax unless it shall be found by them to have been wrongfully or erroneously assessed.
- Article 7. The Collector shall pay to the Town Treasurer each week after he shall have received his tax list and warrant, all moneys by him collected; he shall collect and pay to the Town Treasurer, including payment on County and State Taxes, one-half the amount committed to him, within four months from the time of such commitment, or by the first of November, and the residue by the first day

- of March following, excepting such sums as from his inability to collect the Assessor shall propose to report to the town for abatement, and excepting such discounts as may have been allowed in accordance with a vote of the town. He shall give a bond, with good and sufficient sureties for the faithful discharge of his duties; which bond shall embrace the conditions mentioned above, and shall be for such amounts as the Selectmen may require, and shall be approved in writing by the Selectmen.
- Article 8. The Treasurer shall pay no money whatever, except upon the order of a majority of the Selectmen (except such payments as he may be by law required to make to the State and County treasurers). He shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and payments, and exhibit the same, with vouchers, to the Auditing Committee, or the Selectmen, when requested to do so, and shall annually, at the annual town meeting for the choice of town officers, make a full and detailed report. He shall give a bond, with good and sufficient sureties, for the faithful discharge of his duties, for such amount as the Selectmen may require. and said bond shall be approved in writing by the Selectmen.
- Article 9. The town may choose, at its annual meeting for the choice of town officers, an Auditing Committee of three, whose duty it shall be to audit the accounts of the Treasurer and Collector, and in case such committee is not chosen by the town, the Selectmen shall act as Auditing Committee. Said Auditing Committee shall report to the town at its annual meeting for the choice of town officers following its election.
- Article 10. No person who is a Selectman or Assessor, shall at the same time hold the office of Treasurer, or Collector of Taxes.
- Article 11. All National, State, County and District officers required to be elected at the annual election in November shall be voted for on one ballot.
- Article 12. In all meetings for the choice of town officers, all such officers as are required by law to be elected by ballot (except the Moderator of the meeting, and Collector of Taxes) shall be voted for on one ballot.
- Article 13. No person shall be allowed to pasture cattle or other animals upon any streets or highways in town, either with or without a keeper, provided that this By-Law shall not affect the right of a person to use the land within the limits of such way, adjoining his own land.
- Article 14. No person shall course, coast, or slide, in, across, or along, any of the streets or highways in town, upon any sled, board or otherwise, or snowball in any place prohibited by the Selectmen.

- Article 15. Three, or more persons shall not stand together, or near each other in any street or highway in town in such manner as to obstruct free passage therein; nor be, or remain upon, any sidewalk, street, corner, doorstep, or portico, nor in any church, meeting house, or public hall, or entrance, to the annoyance of the public.
- Article 16. It shall be the duty of any sheriff, constable, policeman or watchman, having jurisdiction in the town, to order any persons offending against the provisions of the preceding section, to "move on," and if said order is not forthwith obeyed, to arrest the person or persons offending.
- Article 17. Any person violating the provisions of Article 13, 14, 15 or 16, of these By-Laws, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00), to be recovered to the use of the town, as by law provided.
- Article 18. The term of office of Constables shall be three years and to provide for election of one Constable each year for two years, and two Constables every third year.
- Article 19. The By-Laws of the town shall be altered at an annual town meeting for the choice of town officers and notice of any proposed alteration shall be given in the Warrant calling said meeting.
  - Article 20. The term of office of Town Clerk is three years.
- Aticle 21. The Number of voters required for a quorum at Town Meetings is 12.

Article 22. The road superintendent, Chief of Police, a Selectmen, or a special police officer as a representative of the Board of Selectmen, for the purpose of removing or plowing snow, or removing ice from any public way, or from any private way open to public use, as has been duly designated by the Town under Section six C of Chapter forty of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) (provided that an appropriation has been duly made for such purposes in accordance with said section six C), is hereby authorized to remove, or cause to be removed, to some convenient place, including in such term a public garage, any vehicle interferring with such work, (between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and eight o'clock in the morning); and to impose liability on the person in whose name such vehicle is registered, or on any other owner thereof, for the cost of such removal and of the storage charges thereof, if any. If the owner of such vehicle or person in whose name it is registered does not, on demand, pay such cost of removal and storage charges, he shall be liable to a penalty in the sum of twenty dollars, to be applied in the first place to the payment of such removal and storage charges, the balance to enure to the town to be applied against such cost of removal.

Article 23. Upon complaint, in writing to the Selectmen or Chief of Police, the owner of premises upon which unregistered and dilapidated motor vehicle and/or parts thereof has been allowed to stand thereon shall remove said unregistered and dilapidated motor vehicle and/or parts within four (4) weeks of being informed of said complaint by the Selectmen or Chief of Police from any premises unlicensed under Chapter 140, Section 57 of the Massachusetts General Laws. The Selectmen's judgment shall be final as to determining whether or not a motor vehicle is junked or dilapidated.

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this By-Law shall pay a fine not to exceed \$10.00 for each offense. Each dilapidated motor vehicle or part thereof that has been allowed to stay on the premises beyond the four (4) week period may constitute a separate offense for each vehicle or part, and each continuing day of such violation may also be considered a separate offense.
