

Board of Selectmen's Report

To The Residents of Hinsdale,

We would like to take this opportunity to present you with a brief recap of the more important items of interest that have transpired this year.

A new water distribution system is now in place except for the piping over the railroad bridge, which should be in place by early spring. Repairs have been made to our dam and reservoir which have been a long time coming. The final phase of the water purification would possibly be a sand filtration system. This could be in place in approximately two years from this writing. This has cleaned up our water somewhat and vastly increased hydrant pressure, which had been a dangerous situation for a number of years.

Town roads are beginning to take shape. All roads connected with new water mains have been overlayed, Creamery Road has been repaved and work is continuing on Pittsfield Road. Our pickup truck has been replaced with a new one ton dump truck.

Again this year Civil Defense Director Ray Bolduc along with Rick Galliher obtained a free truck from the State along with a plow for same. Thanks to Rick and his crew for another fine job.

Our Police Department with thanks to our new chief, Mark Green, and his people is back to normal operation. Equipment is in fine shape along with the acquisition of a new four wheel drive police crusier.

The Fire Department is also in fine shape. The ambulance has been refurbished and a rescue truck is in the process along with a tanker. A lot of time and effort has been expended from a fine group of volunteers.

Recycling is still saving the taxpayers many dollars. Hopefully later this spring or early summer we will begin with plastic. Thanks to you, the people, this will continue to work for us.

Cable television after years of effort has finally come to Hinsdale. Hopefully as the year goes on we may be able to extend this service to some outlying districts, Creamery Road will be completed this year.

Financially, Fiscal Year 1991 (ends June 30, 1991) was again a balancing act because of the State; however, passage of a school override for the continuing annual school cost increases allowed the use of "one-time" free cash, collected mostly from back taxes, for non-ongoing expenses in the highway (truck), police (crusier), Plunkett Lake Dam (repairs) and fire (emergency equipment) areas. Depending on what the School and the State do, the scenario looks very rnuch the same for Fiscal year 1992.

Again, this has been a busy and trying year for our Board as well as the other boards. We would like to take this opportunity to thank them all at this time. Without your time and effort our Town would not be in the positive position as it is today.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

BERKSHIRE, SS:

To one of the Policemen of the Town of Hinsdale:

GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required and directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Hinsdale qualified by law to vote, to meet in Kittredge School Auditorium on Wednesday, May 15, 1991 at 7:00 p.m., then and there to act on the following articles:

- ARTICLE 1 To choose a moderator to preside over the meeting if the elected moderator is not present.
- ARTICLE 2 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$9,618.25 for the Hinsdale Public Library. \$6,858.48 to be raised by taxation and \$2,284.35 to be transferred from State Aid to Libraries Account. This sum and the sum of \$475.42, the amount of the dog tax refund, to be used for the Hinsdale Public Library.
- ARTICLE 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$16,000.00 for Road Machinery Maintenance.
- ARTICLE 4 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for Veterans Aid.
- ARTICLE 5 To see if the Town will vote to approve the Central Berkshire Regional School District Annual Budget for fiscal year as adopted by the Regional School Committee by a two-thirds vote of the Regional School Committee and raise and appropriate \$1,111,973.00 for the Operating Costs of the Central Berkshire Regional School District, contingent upon a favorable override vote of May 18, 1991 in the amount of \$126,465.00.
- ARTICLE 6 To see if the Town will vote to approve the Central Berkshire Regional School District Capital Budget for Fiscal Year 1991 and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,777.00 for said budget.
- ARTICLE 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$16,000.00 for the Police Department.
- ARTICLE $8\,$ To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for Police Equipment.
 - ARTICLE 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$15,000.00

for the Fire Department.

- ARTICLE 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,801.00 for Interest and Principal on the Fire House Loan.
- ARTICLE 11 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Available Funds "Sewer Receipts Reserved For Appropriation" for payment of Principal and Interest on FY1992 sewer debt obligations the sum of \$27,591.00.
- ARTICLE 12 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4,000.00 for Sewer Maintenance from Available Funds "Sewer Receipts Reserved For Appropriation."
- ARTICLE 13 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$30,000.00 for the Hinsdale Sewer Committee Operating Expenses from Available Funds, "Sewer Receipts Reserved For Appropriation" of which amount \$1,000 shall be the salary of the Sewer Administrator.
- ARTICLE 14 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$28,500.00 for the Water Department Operating Expenses from Available Funds, "Water Rents," of which amount \$500.00 shall be for tlle Water Department Administrator salary and \$500.00 to be for Administration Expenses.
- ARTICLE 15 To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the Town Officers in accordance with Chapter 41, Section 108 of Massachusetts General Laws:

- ARTICLE 19 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 for a Reserve Fund.
- ARTICLE 20 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50,300.00 for payment of all Town Insurances during Fiscal Year 1992.
- ARTICLE 21 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for Council On Aging.
- ARTICLE 22 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$11,500.00 for the Town's share of a Circuit Rider.
- ARTICLE 23 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600.00 to remove trees from the Cemetery.
- ARTICLE 24 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000,00 for Fiscal Year 1991 Winter Roads overruns.
- ARTICLE 25 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for Civil Defense.
- ARTICLE 26 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,775.00 for the Northern Berkshire Solid Waste District.
- ARTICLE 27 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for street signs.
- ARTICLE 28 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,500.00 for Water System Rehabilitation easements from Available Funds, "Water Rents Reserved."
- ARTICLE 29 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$5,000.00 for Water System Rehabilitation Bond Counsel and Agents from Available Funds, "Water Rents Reserved."
- ARTICLE 30 To see if the Town will vote to adopt a by-law pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, Section 28G authorizing the Board of Selectmen to set an annual solid waste disposal fee. Such fee will take effect one (1) week (seven (7) days) after publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town. The Board of Selectmen shall hold a public hearing with regards to the proposed fee.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time

and place of holding said meeting.

Report of the Circuit Rider

This has been a busy and challenging year for both me and the "Circuit Rider" program as it pertains to the Town of Hinsdale. Many of the projects I have been working on, under the direction of the Selectmen, are ongoing. However, this has been a year of accomplishment and results as well. Since I left my position with the town of Becket in July of 1990, I have also had more time to work independently on projects that have only been (until now) in the "drawing board" stages. I will attempt to outline just a few of them.

Although nearly all state grant funding rounds were cancelled or postponed during FY '90 and '91, we have received one grant and hope to receive another in the near future. In February we received notification from the Governor's Highway Safety Bureau that Hinsdale had been awarded a \$3500.00 grant for new warning and regulatory signs and breakaway supports. These funds will go a long way in insuring that Hinsdale will continue to make our roadways as safe as possible for the motoring public. We have also applied for a grant from the Department of Environmental Management with the hope of completing the final repairs to Plunkett Lake Dam, which include engineering reports, replacement of rip-rap and complete rebuild and expansion of the present spillway. Until now Hinsdale has been able to appropriate funds for necessary temporary repairs. We have, however, reached an impasse where to complete such final repairs we will need to look at other sources of funding, since this phase will cost in excess of \$125,000.00. For this reason we are working with Commissioner Peter Webber toward a matching grant so that we can create a permanently safe dam and initiate an effective dam management plan as well. In addition, and although the last round of funding was postponed, we will be applying to the Department of Environmental Protection for funding of an aquifer land acquisition program in an amount not to exceed \$50,000.00 to help delineate areas around our watershed in anticipation of future land acquisitions to help protect our water quality.

During 1990 we were also successful in implementing new assessment and regulation programs with regard to our transfer station operation. By initiating a comprehensive recycling program and collecting (what a town by town comparison is) a reasonable fee for trash disposal, we are gradually cutting what has become an astronomical annual cost. Although an initial investment was necessary in joining a district and collecting fees, we have begun to see gradual reductions in our overall costs for the disposal of household trash, recyclables, wood, metals and white goods. We will continue to look for other ways to reduce these costs, one of which I would suggest to be competitively bidding out our waste hauling contracts on an annual basis.

Since May of 1990 I have worked diligently to learn and assist with the implementation of the Uniform Procurement Act (Chapter 30B) for public bidding projects. The economy being as it is, contractors who bid on municipal goods and services and are now more hungry for work have begun to tighten their belts when bidding on such projects and thus small communities are beginning to see lower unit costs and charges. Although this mandate has created an inordinate amount of additional documentation and advertising, we are saving money. A good example of this is the cost of the printing of this

year's Annual Town Report, which is \$400.00 less than last year.

We have also made great strides in enforcement procedures for our town and zoning by-laws. Through a cooperative effort with our town counsel and the Central Berkshire District Court we initiated MGL Chapter 40, Section 21D calling for a non-criminal disposition procedure to enforce our by-laws. At the same time we also now have the tool in place to collect much needed fees from those who choose to ignore or violate them. We are also updating our fee structure for violators, as it is my feeling that we should not just be raising fees for, say, liquor license holders, but for violators of dog restraining, junk car and trailer by-laws, just to name a few.

I have also been keeping a close watch on our town insurances and taking advantage of new coverages as they become available, such as police and fire injury on duty, beneficiary designations, alternative life insurance and (soon to be) alternative health insurance competing with Blue Cross/Blue Shield. To keep premiums down we must keep accurate figures on town properties, vehicles, equipment and deductibles (which help to lower premiums). I have begun to draw up a safety policy to be added to our by-laws to give us a further premium discount. As a member of a non-profit self insurance pool we must be constantly aware of safety and reducing risks if we are to keep our claims down, thereby receiving dividends each year. To date Hinsdale has an excellent record in this area.

In addition, as per new by-laws passed in 1990, I have collected data and begun to draw up legal advertisements for public hearings and annual renewals for the regulation of Hinsdale's gravel bed operators. This will indeed help us to identify gravel bed owners and plot plans of their existing grades, and will also establish annual reporting and inspection procedures, thereby insuring proper activities and restoration.

As an on-going procedure I have over the last year worked with our Tax Collector and Town Counsel in drawing up documentation and legal ads in the initiation of tax collectors' auctions for the non-payment of delinquent property taxes.

Hinsdale has worked diligently over the past three years with New England Telephone Company in moving forward with new enhancements to our telephone network. During October of 1991 we will be receiving a new computer switching system allowing residents to take advantage of services such as touch-tone, call waiting, call forwarding, speed calling and conference calling. This new service will allow the town to be included in the Emergency 911 system, due in large part to our new adopted house numbering system.

As this fiscal year draws to a close, I find myself spending a great deal of time answering to annual report requests by many of our state agencies. These mandates have become quite lengthy and time-consuming, and it is my hope that with the new administration some of them will be relaxed in the near future.

Later this year we will be studying the ways and means by which to discontinue some of our roads and/or public ways by: 1) making a determination as to whether they are indeed public and must be maintained by the town; 2)

discontinuing the way via public hearings and votes; 3) discontinuing the maintenance only of such a way; 4) creating a statutory private way; or, 5) softening the blow of discontinuance by statutorily authorizing the town to maintain such a way without liability or with shared liability.

During the coming year I will continue to redefine and search for new strategies to successfully manage and streamline our town government and its daily operation. I will seek input and ideas from officials and townspeople as to how to address the space problem that exists in what are now professionally functioning town offices that constantly strive to assist their property owners, taxpayers, residents and businesspeople. One of the requests made of me when I took this job was to pursue new avenues for increased economic development in Hinsdale, a town whose annual income is well below the county norm and whose unemployment looms well above the county average. I will continue to seek such opportunities and ask that the citizens of Hinsdale approach me with any innovative idea you might have with regards to economic growth.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Hinsdale's elected and appointed officials, and the many townspeople I've had the opportunity to meet and work with during the past year for your support. I look forward to serving you again during the coming season.

Continued cooperation between Fire, Police and Highway Departments in serving the community makes the effort worthwhile.



Report of Veterans' Services

To the Board of Selectmen:

Budget crises on the state, federal and local scene have not escaped the Veterans' Services program.

Cost of living increases for Disabled Veterans at this writing have been placed on hold. The increase will be taken up when the 102nd Congress convenes early this year. We are hopeful that this will be enacted.

The same cannot be said for the raft of other veterans' benefits that are cut, trimmed back or made more costly by budget negotiators, among them the Burial Benefits.

Effective November 1,1990, only Veterans who die in a VA hospital or who are receiving Disability will receive the full death benefit. Other veterans who formerly were entitled to plot and interment allowances will no longer receive the \$150 allowance.

Also, the VA as stated, is eliminating the \$87 head stone allowance but a Government Marker is still available at no charge.

The elimination of the burial allowance program will save the Veterans Administration \$30 million dollars this year (1991) and \$166 million dollars over the next five years.

During the past year six veterans applied for assistance.

Meetings and seminars on the Persian Gulf have been the number one priority for all Veterans Agents in Berkshire County.

At this writing a bill is in the Senate and will go to the House regarding Veterans' Services to assist needy families of Reservists who have been called to active duty because of the Middle East War.

I look forward to this passage and then word from the office of the Commissioner of Veterans' Services regarding guidelines, budgets, etc.

As in the past, a thank you to Charles J. DeAngelus and his assistants in the placing of flags at the Veterans' sites in the cemeteries, to Edward A. Fogarty for the help in the planning of the annual Memorial Day program, to the Pittsfield office of Veterans' Services for their patient assistance and to the local Board of Selectmen and Finance Board for their continued support of the Veterans' program.




