Selectmen's Report

To The Residents of Hinsdale,

We would like to take this opportunity to present you with a brief recap of the more important items of interest that have taken place this year.

Our new water distribution piping, new hydrants and repairs to the reservoir dam are completed. Next will be, monies permitting, a new filtration system. There are some additional problem area piping which may necessitate replacement depending on funding availability.

Town roads are still in the process of being upgraded, first half of East Washington Road was completed this year, the last mile will be completed in the next year. Again monies permitting we will continue to upgrade according to priority list. Equipment still seems to be in good shape, thanks to daily maintenance by the crew. We would like to thank the DPW crew for another fine job on our winter roads.

Fire Department equipment also seems to be in good shape. This year we have seen the addition of a rescue truck which should be a great asset to the Town. Thanks for all the volunteer work throughout the year; it couldn't all happen without you.

Recycling is still saving the Town money. With the continued cooperation of the Townspeople we can continue to save. We also thank Bob Hamling for a fine job assisting us with this program.

The mega landfill at the time of this writing seems to be a moot isue. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the MINE Committee for their tireless efforts and donations to this cause. Also our State Representatives, State Agencies and all the people that stood behind us during this crucial period. This is what makes this Town extra special, to see everyone working together. Thanks again.

As of the printing of this report a new three member Board of Health should be in place. Due to the heavy load upon our Board, this will give our Board and theirs more time to address our most important issues.

Financially, the Town has survived another year, an achievement in itself for a small town in Massachusetts. We lost \$99,000 per year in State aid in FY92 and stand to lose another \$40,000 in FY93 coming up. Our annual Cherry Sheet aid will be about \$119,000 compared to about \$300,000 three years ago. This amounts to about \$364,000 in four years while Hinsdale's share of School Aid losses is about \$480,000. The total of \$844,000 has been made up by Hinsdale Citizens from tax increases, major back tax collections, savings and fees. The only bright spot is that there's not much more the State can take away and it appears that fiscal responsibility may be returning to the State, anyway.

It has been an extra busy year for all our Boards as well as others and at this time we would like to thank them all for this joint effort, for this is what it takes to keep us in our present strong position.

- ARTICLE 1 To choose a moderator to preside over the meeting if the elected moderator is not present.
- ARTICLE 2 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$9,979.31 for the Hinsdale Public Library. \$7,461.23 to be raised by taxation and \$2,290.14 to be transferred from State Aid to Libraries Account. This sum and the sum of \$227.94 to be applied from the dog tax refund.
- ARTICLE 3 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$20,000.00 for Road Machinery Maintenance.
- ARTICLE 4 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for Veterans Aid.
- ARTICLE 5 To see if the Town will vote to approve the Central Berkshire Regional School District Annual Budget for fiscal year as adopted by the Regional School Committee by a two-thirds vote of the Regional School Committee and raise and appropriate \$1,088,403.00 for the Operating Costs of the Central Berkshire Regional School District.
- ARTICLE 6 To see if the Town will vote to approve the Central Berkshire Regional School District Capital Budget for fiscal year 1993 and raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,427.00 for said budget.
- ARTICLE 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$27,600.00 for the Police Department.
- ARTICLE 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$16,000.00 for Fire Equipment.
- ARTICLE 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,532.00 for Interest and Principal on the Fire House Loan.

- ARTICLE 10 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available funds "Sewer Receipts Reserved For Appropriation" for payment of principal and interest on FY1993 sewer debt obligation the sum of \$27,142.00.
- ARTICLE 11 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4,000.00 for Sewer Maintenance from Available Funds "Sewer Receipts Reserved for Appropriation."
- ARTICLE 12 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$30,000.00 for the Hinsdale Sewer Committee Operating Expenses from Available Funds, "Sewer Receipts Reserved For Appropriation" of which amount \$1,000.00 shall be the salary of the Sewer Administrator.
- ARTICLE 13 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$29,100.00 for the Water Department Operating Expenses from Available Funds, "Water Rents," of which amount \$1,000.00 shall be for the Water Department Administrator salary and \$600.00 to be for Administration Expenses.
- ARTICLE 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Town Handling of Automobile Excise Tax Bills.
- ARTICLE 15 To see if the Town will vote to fix the salaries of the Town Officers in accordance with Chapter 41, Section 108 of Massachusetts General Laws:

ARTICLE 18 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$875.27 for 1992-1993 assessment to the Berkshire Regional Planning District.

ARTICLE 19 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 for a Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 20 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$53,050.00 for payment of all Town Insurance during Fiscal Year 1993.

ARTICLE 22 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for the Town's share of a Social Security and Medicare Taxes.

ARTICLE 23 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,250.00 for an Administrative Assistant.

ARTICLE 24 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum sum of \$2,614.00 for Civil Defense.

ARTICLE 25 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,828.00 for the Northern Berkshire Solid Waste District.

ARTICLE 26 - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$66,161.00 from available funds "Water Rents" to pay the Farmer's Home Administration Bond Payment due September 28, 1992 for the Water Rehabilitation Project.

ARTICLE 27 - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$39,262.00 from available funds "Water Rents" to pay the interest on the Farmer's Home Administration required initial borrowing due July 15, 1992 for the Water Rehabilitation Project.

ARTICLE 28 - To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: The Head of the Fire Department shall grant, per Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 148, Section 10A such permits as may be required by the Rules and Regulations of the Board and/or the State, particularly permits for Fire Inspections and Fire Burning and shall charge fees not to exceed \$10.00 per permit. Said fees will be paid to the Town Treasury and reimbursed to the authorized grantor of the permit through the Fire Department Budget.

ARTICLE 29 - To see if the Town will vote to adopt a proposed Article regarding Lakeview Drive, an approved street located between Vincent Road and Shore Drive, to be regraded to assure proper water runoff and repayed with bituminous asphalt.

ARTICLE 30 - To see if the Town will vote to further amend the agreement providing for the establishment of the Central Berkshire Regional School District, as follows:

- 1. Strike out Subsection IV (E) and insert in lieu thereof, the following Subsection:
- (E) Apportionment of Operating Costs

Operating costs and any capital costs not apportioned pursuant to Section IV D, for the Fiscal Year 1993, and for every Fiscal Year thereafter shall be apportioned to the member towns on the basis of their respective pupil enrollments in the Regional District Schools including the schools referred to in Section III, B. Each member town's share for each fiscal year shall be determined by computing the ratio which the sum of the pupil enrollment of a member town as determined by the census of students in said schools each October 1 for the current Fiscal Year and the preceding four years, bears to the sum of the enrollment of students for the District Schools, as determined by the census of students enrolled in said schools each October 1 for the current Fiscal Year and preceding four years.

This revised method of apportionment of operating school costs to member towns shall be phased in over five years, becoming fully effective in the fifth year. In the first fiscal year following acceptance, costs shall be apportioned according to the pupil enrollment of each member town as determined by the census of students on the previous October 1. In the second year, costs shall be apportioned according to the sum of pupil enrollments as determined by the census on the previous October 1 and the previous October 1 censuses. In the third year costs shall be apportioned according to the sum of pupil enrollments as determined by the two preceding October 1 censuses. In the fourth year, costs shall be apportioned according to the sum of pupil enrollments as determined by the census on the previous October 1 and the three preceding October 1 censuses. In the fifth and subsequent years, costs shall be apportioned according to Paragraph One.

2. This Amendment to the Regional School District Agreement shall become effective following acceptance of said amendment by six of the member towns in accordance with the provisions of Section VI of said Agreement and a continuous section via the said and a continuous section

ARTICLE 31 - To see if the Town will vote to enact the following Town By-law PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT AND ADMINISTRATION OF RENT REGULATION AND THE CONTROL OF EVICTION IN THE BISSELLVILLE ESTATES MOBILE HOME PARK.

Section I

There is hereby established a "Bissellville Estates Mobile Home Park Rent Control Board" consisting of five (5) members representing public interest, none of whom are to be appointed by a majority of the Town Selectmen. The members of the first instance shall be appointed for terms of one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4) and five (5) years. Upon expiration of a term of office, the subsequent term shall be for a period of five (5) years.

Section II

The Board shall regulate rents, set minimum standards for use or occupancy of mobile home park accommodations and evictions of tenants therefrom; and may require information of said owners relating to their park under penalties of perjury.

The Board may make Rules and Regulations, sue and be sued compel attendance of persons and the production of papers and information, and issue

appropriate orders which shall be binding on both the owner and tenant of the said mobile home park.

Section III

The Board may take individual or general adjustments, either upward or downward, as may be necessary to assure that rents for said mobile home park are established on levels which yield to owners a fair net operating income for such units.

Fair net operating income shall be that income which will yield a return, after all reasonable operating expenses, on the fair market value of the property, equal to the debt service rate generally available from institutional first mortgage lenders or such other rates of return as the Board, on the basis of evidence presented before it, deems more appropriate to the circumstances of the case.

Fair market value shall be assessed valuation of the property or such other valuation as the Board, on the basis of evidence presented before it, deems more appropriate to the circumstances of the case.

No proposed rent increase shall be effective without the prior approval of the Board.

The Board may establish further standards and rules consistent with the foregoing.

Section IV

The Board may regulate evictions of tenants at the said mobile home park and may issue orders which shall be a defense to an action of summary process for possession.

Section V

The Board and its actions shall be subject to the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 30A (Administrative Procedures Act) as if the Board were an agency of the Commonwealth.

The Central Berkshire District Court shall have original jurisdiction, concurrently with the Berkshire Superior Court, of all petitions for review brought pursuant to Section 14 of Chapter 30A of the Massachusetts General Laws.

The Superior Court and the District Court of Central Berkshire County shall have concurrent jurisdiction to enforce these provisions, and any ordinance adopted thereunder, and may restrain violations thereof.

Section VI

Violations of this Act or any order of the Board shall be punished by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for any one offense.

Section VII

This Act shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 32 - To see if the Town will vote to adopt a By-law pursuant to the use of so-called "jet-skis" whether by this or any other name is banned in the Town of Hinsdale, with a penalty of \$100.00 for each infraction to be applied

in accordance with Hinsdale's non-criminal disposition By-law.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting up three (3) attested copies thereof, as required by the By-laws of said Town of Hinsdale, ten (10) days at least before holding said meeting. Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding said meeting.

The Hinsdale's M.I.N.E. Committee

In February of 1991, The Berkshire Eagle announced the proposal by out-of-state developer, Andrew DeLillo, to site a 3500 ton per day landfill in the Town of Hinsdale. Major economic promises were made to the townspeople in an effort to entice them to agree to this proposal. However, it was felt that the money being offered was not worth the natural and social destruction it would have caused. A groundswell of grass roots opposition by individuals in Hinsdale and throughout Berkshire County resulted in the formation of the Hinsdale's M.I.N.E. Committee, which stands for Money Is Not Everything.

While the Committee realizes that landfills are a viable lower tier alternative to solid waste management, the size and the location chosen for the project were not acceptable. It was felt that the main purpose of this project was to be an economic boon to the developer, at the expense of our land and other natural resources. We opposed this plan for health, safety, environmental and economic reasons.

In May of 1991, 78% of Hinsdale's registered voters came to the polls, and made their feelings about this project very clear. Ninety-one per cent of those voters voted against the landfill. As the developer had stated that he would not continue his efforts if the townspeople were not in favor of the landfill, it was hoped that this would be the end. However, it was not. The developer made it clear that he would continue with his plans despite the town's overwhelming opposition.

In an effort to keep informed on the issues and legalities of solid waste management, the Town of Hinsdale hired legal assistance and various environmental consultants. To help pay for these services, the Committee raised and donated to the town over \$16,000. The town also asked voters to approve the transfer of a total of \$100,000 from the stabilization fund for use in paying these legal and consulting fees. The town overwhelmingly approved this transfer of funds. At this writing, \$50,000 of this money has been spent.

In January of 1992, Secretary of Environmental Affairs Susan Tierney designated over 14,000 acres of land in Hinsdale, Washington, Dalton and Peru as an Area of Critical Environmental Concern. The area which had been proposed for the landfill was included in this area. In February, the State rejected Mr. DeLillo's landfill proposal because of the negative effects such a project could have on the wonderful natural resources this area contains. By doing so, the State verified the M.I.N.E. Committee's feelings — the site chosen was not appropriate for a landfill, especially one of such magnitude.

However, we expect litigation from the developer, which would add to the town's expenses. We are therefore continuing in our fundraising efforts. If this litigation does not develop, we will use the funds raised to help restore the \$50,000 the town has already spent in this fight.

It's been a busy, trying year, but many positive things have come out of it. We have become a very strong, closely-knit community and have developed a great pride in our town. We have extended the feeling of community beyond the town's borders to include neighboring towns in Berkshire County. Our natural

resources are treasured by many more people than ever before and are protected to a greater degree.

However, we sincerely hope that this chapter in our lives will come to an end in the near future and that 1992 is a better year for all of us.

Rules and Regulations to be Observed in the Town Cemetery Maple Street, Hinsdale, Massachusetts

- Burial plots will be sold to Town residents of at least six (6) months residency, exceptions will be made for former residents who are Hinsdale natives.
- 2. A maximum of two (2) graves only to any one person or family, extenuating circumstances at the discretion of the Cemetery Committee.
- On payment of the agreed price for the burial plot, a deed for burial privileges will be given. If payment is not made in full within sixty (60) days the unused portion will be reclaimed by the Cemetery Committee for resale.
- 4. The grade of any plot shall not be changed, except with the consent and supervision of and by the Cemetery Committee.
- 5. Dimensions of grave markers shall not exceed 12" x 36" x 36".
- 6. Foundation work for grave markers and installation of markers and corner posts shall be by or under the supervision of the Cemetery Committee. All plots are required to have corner markers.
- 7. We prefer flowers to be planted in front of the headstone. No evergreens, trees or shrubs shall be planted on the plots.
- 8. All live flower (cut or plants) decorations will be removed by the Committee when the appearance of such flowers or plants so warrants, this applies also to all artificial decorations.
- 9. All summer decorations will be removed by October 1st. Holiday or winter decorations may be placed after November 15th. All plots to be cleaned up in the spring by April 1st. (Weather permitting on all dates.)
- 10. No glass containers shall be used on the graves for flowers or whatever.
- 11. Funeral flowers, etc. will be removed from the grave no later than one (1) week after the funeral.
- 12. The Cemetery Committee has the authority to remove all existing overgrown shrubs or evergreens.
- 13. Damage to monuments, headstones or markers is not the responsibility of the Cemetery Committee.
- 14. The Cemetery will be closed for burials as of November 1st and open April 1st weather permitting. Burials will be no less than two (2) full days from date of notification to Cemetery Committee.
- 15. Any vandalism or unauthorized traffic will cause the Cemetery Committee to lock and close the Cemetery from sundown to sunrise at their discretion.

These rules and regulations amended on August 25, 1986 by the seven (7) member Cemetery Committee.

Civil Defense Town Report

The Hinsdale Civil Defense Department has had a name change. The new name is the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency—Hinsdale. This occurred to align the state and the federal Emergency Management Agency.

The three year development plan has been accomplished. The following facilities have an auxiliary generator in place:

Fire Station Lion's Club

If the emergency shelter is activated, blankets and sleeping bags are in storage, should they be needed.

The pick-up truck was painted and lettered, at a minimal cost to the community.

In preparations for night search operations, the trailer mounted generator was pressed into service. This unit would have provided necessary lighting for the search operations site. Fortunately, the child was located prior to night fall.

We will continue to build a strong organization in order to better serve the Town of Hinsdale.

Report of the Fire Chief

The Hinsdale Fire Department responded to a total of 79 Fire Calls for the year of 1991.

The Fire Department responded to 60 Fire Calls in Hinsdale and provided mutual aid on 19 calls as follows: 9 calls to Dalton, 4 calls to Peru, 3 calls to Becket, 1 call to Pittsfield, 1 call to Washington and 1 call to Chester.

A breakdown of the Fire Calls is as follows: 21 structure fires, 15 brush and forest fires, 13 motor vehicle accidents, 10 medical emergencies, search and rescue and near-drownings, 7 telephone pole fires and 7 electrical wires down, 5 kitchen and laundry fires, 5 fire alarms activated, 2 chimney fires and 1 water problem.

The Fire Department ended the year with 24 active firefighters. The Hinsdale Fire Department became the first fire department in Berkshire County to offer and complete the Firefighter Level One Course. The fire department is now operating with 2 fire engines, 1 tanker, 1 rescue truck, 1 airlight truck and 1 ambulance.

Hinsdale Volunteer Fireman's Association

The Hinsdale Volunteer Firemen's Association responded to a total of 265 calls for the year of 1991.

The Hinsdale Fire Department responded to 60 fire calls in Hinsdale and provided mutual aid to the following towns: 9 calls to Dalton, 4 calls to Peru, 3 calls to Becket, 1 call to Pittsfield, 1 call to Washington and 1 call to Chester for a total of 79 fire department calls.

The fire department responded to 21 structure fires, 15 brush and forest fires, 13 motor vehicle accidents, 10 medical emergencies, search and recue and near-drownings, 7 telephone pole fires and electrical wires down, 5 kitchen and laundry fires, 5 fire alarms activated, 2 chimney fires and 1 water problem for a total of 79 fire calls.

The Hinsdale Fire Department responded with the Hinsdale Ambulance to 186 calls in 1991 as follows: 113 calls to Hinsdale, 22 calls to Washington, 21 mutual aid calls to Dalton, 12 calls to Peru, 8 calls to Chester, 7 calls to Middlefield and 3 mutual aid calls to Becket.

The nature of 186 ambulance calls were as follows: 69 cardiac or respiratory problems, 54 medical or surgical problems, 35 orthopedic problems, 17 motor vehicle accidents, 8 fire standbys, and 3 water rescues.

The fire department ended the year with 24 active firefighters of which 15 are also Emergency Medical Technicians. The Hinsdale Fire Department became the first fire department in Berkshire County to offer and complete the Firefighter Level One Course. The fire department is now operating with 2 fire engines, 1 tanker, 1 rescue truck, 1 air-light truck and the ambulance.

The Hinsdale Ambulance received its Advanced Life Support License in 1991 and currently has 14 EMT's at the Basic/MAST level, 2 EMT's at the Intermediate Level and 1 EMT at the Paramedic Level, giving the ambulance a total of 17 Emergency Medical Technicians. These MET's cover the towns of Hinsdale, Middlefield, Peru and Washington, as well as providing mutual aid to any town requesting our help.

Any resident of Hinsdale interested in becoming a Hinsdale Firefighter and/or an Emergency Medical Technician please come to the Fire Department any Tuesday night between the hours of 6:30 pm and 9:00 pm and ask to speak with the Fire Chief. We need you and your support.

Department of Public Works

This past year, the Department of Public Works was busy with projects including cutting brush, patching potholes, scraping gravel roads, sweeping streets, upgrading drainage ditches, and replacing culverts. The repaving of section of East Washington Road was done with state aid and our own monies. State aid is down but still trickling in, so projects we planned are becoming backed up. Chapter 90 monies haven't been allocated properly by the State for a few years now, and nobody knows if or when they will be.

This department benefited from the use of the Berkshire County House of Correction's Community Service Program. Projects accomplished were: Painting the town garage main building, the storage garage roof recoated, reflectorized paint applied to fire hydrants in order to make them more visible at night, painting of two sand spreaders, and installing blacktop waterways in several parts of town. A total of 306 man hours were donated. Through Sheriff Carmen C. Massimiano, Jr., we were able to achieve this work.

The town applied for and received a grant for regulatory signs from the Governor's Highway Safety Bureau in the amount of \$3,321.00, which is 100% reimbursable.

Winter road maintenance has raised havor with our current budget, because even the small snowstorms we have been having leave the roads slippery and icy, requiring sanding and/or salting. Costs of materials have also risen, and the area which is serviced has increased, demanding the overrun of this account.

In these times of financial shortfalls throughout the town, this budget, for reasons of safety, should be re-examined, or services will have to be cut back.

In closing, I would like to thank all the people who have assisted this department in functioning smoothly in the past year.

Library Restorative Repairs

The Hinsdale Library building was built in 1866 as a memorial to Mary Plunkett Twining, who died at the age of 28. Funds were given by the Plunkett, Goodrich, and Taylor families, among others. Designed by a leading architect of the day, Leopold Eidlitz, in a style resembling English Tudor, which Mrs. Twining had admired during her honeymoon in England, the building was soundly constructed, principally of stone quarried locally and native timbers, and was presented to Hinsdale to house the book collection of the Hinsdale Library Association. Some years later the Association made the library public for use by all residents, functioning in connection with all town and city libraries in the Commonwealth with direction from the Massachusetts Library Commission.

Over the more than 125 years since its dedication the building has suffered the onslought of weather and natural elements, resulting in gradual deterioration of some parts of the structure. Annual and periodic maintenance has helped to preserve the building's integrity, but progressive damage to external woodwork, windows, brickworks, plaster, and other details now requires some major repairs. The Town was asked to appropriate \$9,995 at a special town meeting on February 19, 1992. This amount, and additional reserve funds of the Association will be used for restorative repairs, which will include: tie rods to stabilize the roof and upper sidewalls, replacement of missing and deteriorated timbers in the gables, repointing of masonry, installation of several new windows, and cleaning, sealing and painting of exterior woodwork.

The Hinsdale Library is an attractive historical property, rightfully regarded by visitors and residents alike as well worth preserving for generations to come.

A recent addition to the property is a bronze commemorative plaque placed on a boulder which unearthed during sewer construction on Bingham Street several years ago and moved to a spot on the Library lawn. It honors the Reverend Theodore Hinsdale and acknowleges his efforts in obtaining the Town's charter in 1804. His contemporaries felt that his contribution was so unique and singularly successful that it was fitting for the town to bear his name.

Funds for the plaque were contributed by the Mr. & Mrs. Club, The New Century Club, The Country Road Co-op Corp., collections in canisters put in local business places, and donations by various individuals.

Report of the Police Department

The hard work of the Officers of the Department has led to the arrest of twenty-six people, the issuance of 402 citations, and the response to over 400 calls.

We have, and continue to attend, classes that enable the Department to better serve the town. We now have two Officers trained in Crime Photography, and we are in the process of sending two Officers to school for Fingerprinting. We also have one of our Officers trained as a Fire Arms Instructor. We will continue to attend any training courses that will help us serve the town in the most professional way.

Our Department also is involved in a variety of community projects. We sponsor "Operation Ident-A-Child," the "Safe House Program," and also our "D.A.R.E. Golf Tournament." The Police Association holds a spring dance that enables us to contribute to such projects as the Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Kittredge School Playground Fund and the STEPP Program. We have tried to make a difference . . . during this past Holiday Season we gave Christmas Baskets to several families in town.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of Hinsdale for their support, the Town Officials for their cooperation, and most of all, the Officers and their families for their loyalty and dedication to our Department.

Report of the Veterans' Agent

To the Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen —

The past year of Veterans Services brought several Veterans for assistance. Two veterans are continuing their education; one has re-enlisted; two were able to find employment and one veteran is receiving monthly benefits.

Compensation payments for Disabled Veterans was increased by 3.7 percent effective December 1, 1991. The cost of living increase allowance was included in legislation and signed by President Bush November 12, 1991. Since passage of the legislation, Veteran Affairs has been working to insure that veterans January, 1992 checks reflect the increase. The increase affects Veterans whose monthly payments will range from \$83 for a single veteran with a 10-percent disability rating to \$1,680 for a single veteran with a 100-percent disability rating.

Military veterans who served in Hawaii during the 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor are eligible to receive a Congressional medal commemorating the 50th anniversary of the attack. Some eligible veterans have applied for this medal . . . others may contact me for further information and forms.

Service in the Persian Gulf War is considered wartime service for Veterans' Assistance benefit purposes. The Persian Gulf period is defined as beginning August 2, 1990 and ending at a future date to be determined by presidential proclamation or by law.

I am requesting an increase in appropriations for fiscal years 1992-1993 due to the countries economic stature and the due respect to the veterans and their families who apply and are eligible for assistance.

The Commissioner of Veterans' Services and Examiners have allowed me to continue as Veterans' Agent due to the fact that I have held the position for several years... but a Veterans' Agent should be a Veteran.

At this time I am requesting that a Veteran apply to the Board of Selectmen for the position and at the same time, due to the increase of paper work, attending meetings and work seminars that a salary increase be also established.

I will always be available to assist a new Veterans' Agent.

I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee for their cooperation and support in the Veterans' program.

To Charles J. DeAngelus in his assistance in placing flags at the grave sites of Veterans at the local cemeteries; to Edward J. - The district would save \$176,000 in teachers' salary give-backs. The 1. district will never have to pay them back. The district will save an additional \$45,000 in other staff (non-teachers) givebacks, for a total savings of \$221,000.
- The district will still have to make cuts totalling \$618,609 off of the 2.
- budget certified by the School Committee on 3/5/92.
 The total increase in the school budget between 1991/92 and 1992/93 would be \$353,313, or an increase of 3.06%. Because the revenue expected this year is only a 2.8% increase over last year's revenue, the net town levy for the district would be 3.24%.
- This year, the town of Hinsdale would be assessed \$7,799 <u>LESS</u> than we paid the district last year, and \$90,224 <u>LESS</u> than was assessed in the certified budget approved by the School Committee on 3/5/92.
- A teacher making \$30,000 per year in 1991/92 will give up \$900 of his/her previously negotiated salary for the 92/93 school year. On top of this, like the rest of us, he/she will be paying taxes to support the schools.
